The Royal Australian Regiment Association congratulates His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Hieu Van Le (pictured) on his wonderful achievement in being announced as the newly-appointed Governor Elect for South Australia.

The Premier the Hon Jay Weatherill said:

"Her Majesty The Queen has approved the appointment of Mr Hieu Van Le AO as the next Governor of South Australia, beginning 2nd of September this year. must commence my 2014/15 elected term as your Secretary with a call to arms. During our trip to Vietnam in March and April this year, we purchased supplies for the Vung Tau Orphanage. We spent time among the children, many with HIV and others with various severe disabilities.

It was a moving visit, but the many volunteers and workers in the orphanage did their best, which was better than the alternative for these poor children. Later we visited the Long Hai School, which provided a basic education for those children who cannot afford the very minimal fees required to put a child through school. Some of the children were close to 10 years old before being able to start in Grade 1, such is their penury. The school provided a basic education and further training for the students to become hairdressers or motor bike mechanics. The school also provides one free meal a day for all its children

In one photo you can see some of the sewing machines which RARA members generously contributed towards last year. The machines are used to manufacture clothes for the children and staff and help towards making the school kids more independent. There is a future for at least some of these children.





LONGTITUDINAL STUDY

A honours student from UniSA has commenced a study into the longer term benefits of the trek. Although many of the trekkers remain in contact with the staff, the long term impacts have not been independently quantified. We know the impact of the trek is powerful and in some cases life changing, but we do not know the facts regarding the longevity of those outcomes. Such investigation may reveal that follow-up in some form may be worthy of consideration. We look forward to her report.

Students' poppy sales benefit Trojan's Trek

What does Marryatville Primary School have to with Trojans Trek? They have become part of the school fundraising base to assist Trojans Trek.

On the 11 November 2013, the school librarian **Nicole Nelson** and assistant librarian **Tsam (Sam) Georgoudis**, organised students from the school to make poppies and use them as a fundraiser. Students volunteered their time and produced some 400 plus poppies, the school has about 500 students. Selling the poppies at 50 cents each, the school decided the money would be donated to Trojan's Trek to assist our wounded and damaged war veterans, past and present.

Why did they decide on Trojan's Trek as the recipient? The school decided that because of the School Military History program through the Royal Australian Regiment Assn SA and 3RAR SA Association this was the appropriate thing for the school to do.

On Friday 13 December 2013 at end of year school break up, I was invited to attend the school assembly,

during which I was called forward and **Nicole Nelson** presented me with a rather large sized mock-up cheque made out for \$207.35 for Trojan's Trek. They then presented the bankable cheque.

The children had sold 414 poppies. They have pride in what they had achieved for our veterans.

This school, along with so many others, evokes the pride the youth of today are displaying towards our veterans.

The school, under the guidance of the Principal **Anne Bahnisch** and library staff with the students have decided they will now make this an annual event with the proceeds going to Trojan's Trek from the Remembrance Day poppy sales.


Both the Royal Australian Regiment and the 3rd Cavalry Regiment were awarded the battle honour Long Tan for their actions on 18 August 1966.

Park commencing at 1100 hours.


The Royal Australian Regiment was awarded the battle honour Maryang San for 3 RAR's actions 2-8 October 1951 as part of Operation Commando.

Calibre of PM's military health council members impressive

The Prime Minister's Advisory Council on Military Mental Health (PMAC) met at Parliament House, Canberra, on Thursday and Friday July 24 and 25.

Chaired by Vice Admiral Vice Russ Crane AO, CSM, RAN (retd) with Ben Roberts Smith VC, MG as deputy chair, the PMAC spent two very productive days in being briefed by various experts in military mental health and discussions and planning to address what is a serious issue.

The Prime Minister, The Hon Tony Abbott MP and the Minister of Veteran Affairs, Senator The Hon Michael Ronaldson are absolutely adamant that soldiers returning from post 1975 conflicts will not suffer the isolation and indifference experienced by the Vietnam Veterans.

Nominated by the members of the DVA Ex Service Organization Round Table, I am both proud and humbled to be accepted as a member of the PMAC.

I look forward to this body making the appropriate recommendations to the Ministers which hopefully will make a difference.

I do not profess to be an expert in military mental health but I have been around long enough to know and understand the issues in particular as they affected so many after Vietnam, me included, and what I will bring to the table is the passion and the determination to ensure our many young men and women who have done an outstanding job post 1975 will not be forced to suffer silently on their own, like so many after the Vietnam War.

After two days discussions I am really excited and encouraged by the talent and experiences of the members of the Council who are a good mix of gender, maturity and service. But, most importantly, well led by the Chair and all on the same page.

Final Farewell

The family, friends and the RAR Association bade Mike an appropriate and deserving final farewell

at his funeral at the Heysen Chapel on Friday 9 May 2014 followed by a memorial service at the RARA Club Rooms on Saturday 10 May 2014. So typical of Mike, he had planned both events to such a level that all we really had to do was turn up, which we did in our hundreds.

Heysen Chapel was bursting with many standing at the rear. I would defy anyone in the congregation admitting to not having a tear in their eye when Mike's sister spoke so lovingly and full of interest in what Mike and his sister used to get up to in the wilds of Papua New Guinea as young kids and the Fijian choir singing so beautifully to bid Mike farewell.

Many of you would know that Mike was the Honorary Counsel for Fiji in South Australia and the relationship Mike and his family had with Fiji and their people which went back to Mike's great grandfather ,who was the first Harbor Master of Suva in the early 1800s.

Appropriately Mike's funeral was a solemn affair. But the memorial service the following day really was a very humorous celebration of life where both of Mike's sons spoke and revealed what we knew about him all along.



After a long and courageous battle with cancer, Lieutenant Colonel Mike Dennis passed at 4.15pm on Saturday 3 May 2014.

Mike had a long and distinguished career as an Infantry Solider and Officer over 28 years. He enlisted as a private in 1967 and after initial and corps training was posted to 9 Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment. He was quickly promoted to section commander, but suffered an injury during training which prevented him from deploying with the Battalion to Vietnam in 1968. However he applied and was accepted to attend the Officer Cadet School at Portsea in 1968.

On graduation in 1969 into Infantry, he was posted to the 1 Battalion, The Pacific Islands Regiment, where he served as a platoon commander until 1972 when he was posted to the 2 Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment as Pioneer Platoon Commander.

In 1973-74 he was posted as Adjutant of the Monash University regiment and the Adelaide University regiment as Training Officer.

From 1975 to 1978 he served in South Australia in Headquarters, Fourth Military district and then as a Company Second in Command with 3 Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment. From Adelaide he was sent to the Land Warfare Centre, Canungra, as an Instructor on Battle Wing, a very much sought after posting. In 1982 Mike returned to Papua New Guinea as the Major, Operations Officer of the 1 Battalion, The Pacific Islands Regiment. During this posting he was appointed

He was a stickler for organisation and to get both Simon and Sean organised must have been an extremely daunting and frustrating task and this was revealed in

their presentations.

The service was attended by the then Lieutenant Governor the Honourable Hieu Van Le AO and the Second Secretary of the Fiji High Commission Jonetani Tagivetaua and his wife and many friends from interstate and overseas.

A humorous and very informative military eulogy was delivered by Laurie Lewis and the Vietnam Tourist Team donned their fawn cotton coats and fedora hats to recall Mike's last trip overseas which he had organised. Annie has been a tower of strength, wonderfully supported by all of her family and friends and will I am sure fire us up as Mike used to if something is amiss in the Club. You have all been warned!

Mike may no longer be with us but his spirit and presence will always be remembered through this very appropriate quote:

"The basic difference between an ordinary man and a warrior is that a warrior takes everything as a challenge, while an ordinary man takes everything as a blessing or as a curse."

a Member of the Order of The British Empire (MBE) by the Papua New Guinea Government in recognition of his outstanding service.

In 1986, after a brief posting in Townsville he was appointed a senior desk officer at the Defence Intelligence Organisation, Canberra. Then followed a series of intelligence/diplomatic appointments centred around Papua New Guinea and the Pacific Islands. These culminated in an appointment as Defence Attache South Pacific, covering Fiji, Tonga, Western Samoa, Kiribati and Tuvalu.

Mike resigned from the army in 1995 and entered the commercial world. His subsequent appointments included General Manager of Suncorp Stadium Brisbane, Cleanevent Australia and Vice President of Cleanevent International.

He became heavily involved in veterans' issues, working with the department of Veterans' Affairs, the RSL and the RAR Association (SA). He was appointed to the Minister For Veterans' Affairs National Committee on Emerging Issues in the Australian Defence Force. He was a strong advocate for a range of veterans' issues, especially those which he believed deprived veterans and their families of seductive and their rights.

He will be sadly missed by the veterans' community.

Colonel Dennis was Fiji's Honorary Consul in SA from March 2006. His appointment did not come as a surprise as he had the experience, passion and love for the country and a deep connection to our beautiful country.

His great great grandfather Captain Robert Cocks, great grandfather James Cocks, his grandmother Amy Florence Cocks and his father John Denis were born in Fiji and his grandfather Selwin Dennis, although born in Victoria, died in Fiji.

Colonel Dennis served as the Australian Defence Attache to the South Pacific from 1991 and was based at the Australian High Commission in Suva.

He was the first coach and manager of the Fiji National Rugby League team.

"Fiji has indeed lost one of its true sons. We will never be able to repay the many sacrifices and achievements Colonel Dennis has done for Fiji."



nitially Dad found civilian life very hard. For my brother and I growing up as Army brats it felt like we were attending Duntroon every day and he as our Commanding Officer. An expectation of excellence and doing it the army way even though we were only kids. I thank Dad for it as it was an amazing experience. Once Dad settled into retirement he became our father - nothing else but our Dad - no longer the Commanding officer and for a good 15 or so years we can truly say we were close mates.

Dad was diagnosed with cancer just a couple of months before my wedding. The first round of chemotherapy and radiotherapy almost took him. During one of his darkest moments he looked at Mum and said he had premonition.

Mike and Ann played a significant role in not only providing professional and family support to all families, they went out of their way to bring us together professionally and socially and bind us together as one integrated supportive family.

The degree of trust, friendship and confidence generated by Mike's leadership role cannot be overstated.

On a lighter note, although security was a concern in Port Moresby, the Dennis clan were the only ones who left their gate permanently unlocked.

They had a squeaky gate and Herman, a cross between a Rottweiler, Rhodesian Ridgeback and a lion. When the gate squeaked Herman would run to the gate like a bolt of lightning. Mike said: "The only thing left, as an

unfortunate gate-opener ran down the road chased by Herman, was poop and sandshoes". Ann spent time stitching up those who tried to enter and were caught by Herman. The Pith Club, under

Mike's leadership, became a tongue-in-check stab at the old colonial past.

The blokes wore white suits and pith helmets (known as solar topees) and the ladies evening wear or saris. The club arranged numerous trips and fun adventures.

"I don't think anybody at that time would have wanted to spend Christmas in any other location (the Dennises) or in any other way.

Mike in this way was letting everyone know indirectly that all was good and all was safe."

"Mike was able to always maintain the dignity and respect appropriate to his

rank and position. He never had to demand respect, he had 100% from all of us.

"You have been a true supporter of PNG and its people. You were never afraid to speak out in defence of a true cause when the tide of opinion was against it.

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down this life for his friends. We said it and meant it" Mike lived his live to the full and took us along for the ride. We are privileged to have known him and served with him. He is a true mate who will be missed.

The story behind this photo is that Mike had organised a trip to Vietnam he was determined to see the group off so we went to Saigon a few weeks before his death. The jackets and the hats were Mike's idea as part of the trip. The jacket on the chair is Mike's and his hat is on Lynn's head - Ann.

y big brother Mike was born on 17 November 1946 in the King George V Memorial Hospital in Sydney. Mum and Mike went to New Guinea on the Malaita, one of the early ship to take women and children back after the war. Mum recalled how shocked she was to see Japanese prisoners of war walking around Lae when she arrived.

They lived in Bulolo until I was born when they moved to our plantation called Kareeba on New Britain island. Dad grew cocoa and coffee.

Mike, Jenny and I grew up on Kareeba as little bush kids. We spoke Pidgin, never wore shoes except to go to town or Australia every three years, and were full of hookworm. Camoquin or Nivaquin crunched up with honey to keep malaria at bay was the worst time of the week. We played soldiers endlessly, Mike, with his real unloaded gun over his shoulder. We had a secret cave we visited daily. One day Mum and Dad found us playing among the left over war supplies and ammunition! Mike and I would sit on the

cookhouse steps waiting for the toads which he shot with our pellet guns.

In 1958 Jenny was born and Mike carried her everywhere attached to his hip whatever he was doing.

Then Mike went to boarding school in Sydney. Oh how we missed him. Later he became a day boy and lived with Auntie Enid and Uncle Henry and their daughter Rhonda. When he left school he worked with Dad on the plantation but it didn't work out. So he went to work where his first manager was Nobby Clark.

He had a wonderful time in town - parties, surfing, parties, scuba diving taking photos of the fish and coral, parties, deep sea diving, etc. In 1964 he joined the Papuan New Guinea Volunteer Rifles which began his long army career.

We had an isolated life but truly wonderful friends who lived on other plantations and who are still friends, including Jan Mackay who is here today.

I have a lovely message from the Donald family in Queensland.

"What can we say, you were like family to us and we knew Mike so well and loved him. He

was so decent and loyal in everything else that make a bloke something special." Mike, you have flowers from us all - orchids for your love of orchids in New Guinea and Fiji with Annie and the boys, bougainvillea from my garden and frangipanis from Jenny and me representing the plantation days and hibiscus from yours and Annie's garden. So, Mike, I hope Mum and Dad are sitting on a verandah somewhere, Dad with a rum and Mum with gin and water and a drink poured for you - for their man's man, their officer and their gentleman

announced it. The thought of being there for the birth of his first grandchild gave Dad his next short-term goal to live for. On 7 June 2013 Harvey Michael Dennis arrived and Dad was ecstatic. For the 11 months he had Harvey in his life there was a special connection between the two. Harvey would look at Dad with innocent eyes and Dad would stare back at Harvey with love and admiration. He was so proud of his "little boy".

Despite being advised in the second half of last year that the

cancer had returned - this time in Dad's lungs - he set his next short term goal. A holiday in Bali with all of us together as a family.

Unfortunately for Dad, the most recent of his travels with Mum and close friends, the trip to Malaysia and Vietnam would be his last. This was only six weeks ago.

Mum, Sean and I and all of Dad's extended relatives I say a very special thank you to everyone who supported him and Mum through what has been a very difficult two and a half years.

To the members of the SA RAR Association, Dad's Band of Brothers, you are family, it's that simple. You gave

Dad friendship he needed in the post army years to feel important again, and you've given Mum the support and

strength to make it through the ups and downs.

In true Mike style he went on his own terms, in his own bed, surrounded by his friends and family. He wouldn't have had it any other way.

Simon also recalled:

The way his mother saved his father's life.

The time Mike turned up at Ann's home with a box of chocolates for her birthday and the reverse psychology, Ann became interested but when Mike asked Ann's father for her hand in marriage he was met with" She is

not marrying a bloody private. Come and see me when you are an Officer". When he returned as an Officer and after a two-year engagement they married and moved to PNG the day after their wedding.



THE ARMY MUSEUM OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA [AMOSA]

A brief narrative by Major C. Roe, Manager

The Military Museum of South Australia was inaugurated at a meeting on 21 September 1992.

Since then it has been at a variety of locations within Keswick Barracks. The galleries are now in Building 76 with the unit – AMOSA as it became known – also housing administrative and command elements almost adjacent in Building 203 and having part or full occupancy of a variety of other storage facilities in Keswick Barracks. Easy access to one of Adelaide's main roads, aptly named Anzac Highway, and the retention of Keswick as an open barracks makes this museum particularly accessible to those people wishing to visit "off the street."

AMOSA is a fully functioning part of the Army Museum Network [AMN] as one the 'Regional' (as opposed to 'Corps') museums.

Sunday afternoons see the Museum proper open to the public for a four-hour block - noon to 4pm. Tours can be conducted then and at most other times by negotiation. The Museum Catering Group [MCG] supports tours with a barbecue and light lunches, if requested, and the Keswick Barracks Heritage Walk can be included at any time as an adjunct to a museum tour. The Army Museum of South Australia Foundation [AMOSAF] supports the organisation as a whole with board, regional networking and minor fundraising responsibilities.

AMOSA is widely recognised as one of the state's best small displays and is working hard to promote itself to as broad a range of organisations as possible.

This is especially important as we traverse the Great War anniversary years of 2014-18.

45th Anniversary Commemorative Services

In the first half of July we conducted the last two of the 45th Anniversary of the deaths of our SA war dead. The first was at Whyalla for LCpl **Richard Abraham** who was KIA on 6 July 1969. Rick was the Section 2IC of 2 Section 10 Platoon D Company 9 RAR and was killed when the enemy fired upon the platoon's ambush position.

A Meet & Greet was held at Rick's nephew's home on July 5 followed by the commemorative service at the Whyalla Cemetery at 1100hrs next day. This was followed by a short service at the Whyalla Oval where there is a pictorial display of Rick's and Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War. The service was well attended with Rick's family and family friends and 10 Platoon playing key roles at both services.

A highlight of the service was the letter by **Peter Abraham** and read by family friend **Geoff Ettridge** which described the desperate method Rick took to get fit to pass his Army medical after a motor bike accident left a leg with multiple fractures and the subsequent placing of pins in the leg. After working on the injury Rick had the pins removed and passed his medical to enable him to do his duty in National Service. Talk about Duty First.

The second service was at Centennial Park for Cpl Bruno Adamczyk, who, along with his forward scout Pte Beresford Paul Edwards were KIA on 12 July 1969 while investigating a bunker system. Bruno was a veteran of active service in Borneo with 4 RAR and was the Section Commander 5 Section 11 Platoon D Company 9 RAR. The service was well attended with Bruno's family and D Company having keys roles and was followed by lunch at the Torrens Arms Hotel.
